



The Annapolis Observer is IRO's weekly update on happenings in Annapolis and highlights the progress of key bills of interest to WSSC Water, as well as provide timely updates and calendar of important dates.

#### A Note from WSSC Water's Intergovernmental Relations Office

The 2025 Legislative Session is in full swing. The General Assembly House of Delegates and Senate chambers are considering over 700 pieces of legislation. Committees have begun holding work sessions to discuss bills and proposed amendments, and scheduled votes on whether bills should move forward to the next phase of the legislative process.

IRO is on the front-line advocating for legislation that impacts our work. We cover a variety of subject matters and focus on legislation that helps fulfill our Smart One Water Mission and analyze the impact of state and federal legislation on WSSC Water. We ensure all communities thrive by ethically delivering safe, reliable and sustainable water and wastewater services. In every home, every business, we make everything possible by ensuring access to dependable and safe water for everyday life.

## **Legislative Updates**

This session, WSSC Water-sponsored bills are assigned to the Prince George's County House Delegation for first consideration. WSSC Water has submitted two bills: MC/PG 102-25 – Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission – Design and Construction – Alternative Project Delivery and Solicitation Methods; and MC/PG 112-25 – Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission – Service Charges. Based on the subject matter, both bills are initially reviewed by the Delegation's Bi-County Committee.

On January 23, MC/PG 102-25 was placed on the Bi-County Committee's agenda for a vote. IRO staff joined the meeting to answer questions on the bill, and the bill was unanimously recommended to move forward for consideration by the full Prince George's County House Delegation. On January 24, the Delegation voted unanimously to support the bill and it will now pass onto the Montgomery County House Delegation for consideration. MC/PG 112-25 will be placed on the Bi-County Committee's agenda at a future date.

IRO is also monitoring legislation impacting WSSC Water. Three WSSC Water-related bills have been introduced: <a href="MC/PG 101-25">MC/PG 101-25</a> – Montgomery County Planning Board and Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission – Open Meetings – Live Streaming (Palakovich Carr); <a href="MC/PG 105-25">MC/PG 105-25</a> – Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission – Membership, Transparency, Billing, and Planning (WSSC Transparency and Reform Act of 2025) (Korman, Wilkins, Barnes); and <a href="MC/PG 107-25">MC/PG 107-25</a> – Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission – System Development Charge – Exemptions (Moon). As Montgomery County delegates, these bills are first considered by the Montgomery County House Delegation committees.

MC/PG 101-25 was referred to the Delegation's Metro Washington Committee. On January 20, MC/PG 101-25 was placed on the Metro Washington Committee's agenda for a vote and the bill was unanimously recommended to move forward for consideration by the full Montgomery County House Delegation. On January 24, the Delegation voted unanimously to support the bill and it will now pass onto the Prince George's County House Delegation for consideration. The Commission supports MC/PG 101-25.

MC/PG 105-25 was also referred to the Delegation's Metro Washington Committee which held its first work session on January 13. The sponsor has indicated he will be proposing amendments to the bill. The Commissioners will hold a special meeting on January 28 to consider taking a position on the bill and potential amendments.

MC/PG 107-25 was referred to the Delegation's Economic Development Committee. The bill has received amendments from the Montgomery County Executive and members of the Economic Development Committee. Commissioners will be presented amendments and will consider staff's recommendation on taking a formal position on MC/PG 107-25 at an upcoming Commission meeting.

# WSSC Water Accepting Applications for 2025 Commissioners' Engineering Scholarship

Applications are now available for the 2024 Commissioners' Engineering Scholarship. The deadline to apply is **Saturday**, **February 15**, **2025**.

- The scholarship, which provides \$2,000 per year, supports WSSC Water's ongoing efforts to attract aspiring engineers to careers in the water industry.
- The scholarship is open to undergraduate or graduate students with permanent residency in Montgomery or Prince George's counties and are enrolled in a full-time college or university engineering program. Graduating high school seniors accepted into a college engineering program are also eligible.
- Applicants must include and introductory video and essay, two reference letters, an
  official transcript and proof of residency in WSSC Water's service district.

#### WSSC Water is Winter Ready – Are You?

As colder temperatures settle into the region, water main breaks increase. However, WSSC Water crews are prepared for the increase in breaks and leaks with people, pipes, trucks and tools at the ready! WSSC Water experiences an increase in water main breaks and leaks a few days after the temperature of the Potomac River hits a new low. The river is the primary source of drinking water for 1.9 million WSSC Water customers in Montgomery and Prince George's counties. When a new low temperature is reached, the colder water can shock pipes, increasing the number of breaks and leaks. One of the nation's largest water utilities, WSSC Water spends approximately \$17 million each year for emergency water main repairs, with about \$10 million spent November through February.

Customers are encouraged to report water main breaks and leaks as quickly as possible. There are three simple ways to report a break or leak to WSSC Water's 24-hour Emergency Services Center:

Via mobile app: WSSC Water's Mobile App

The "Report a Problem" feature on the mobile app allows customers to easily snap a picture of a possible water main break or leak and send it directly to the Emergency Services Center. The app uses GPS to pinpoint the location of the image, which allows dispatchers to send an inspector to the site.

WSSC Water maintains the pipes in the streets and the connections up to the property line. If a pipe in a home freezes, it is the homeowner's responsibility to repair. #### Can The Grease

Fats and oils can build up inside pipes and over time restrict wastewater flow - if they are poured down the drain. Pouring fats, oils or grease down the drain will cause clogs, possible sewer backups into your home and sewage overflows in the WSSC Water system. Do your part by properly disposing of fats, oils and grease:

- Pour the oil or grease into a can
- Put a lid on the can
- Cool the can of grease in the refrigerator
- When it's full, toss the can into the trash
- Be sure the can is covered so that if the grease melts, it does not spill into your trash.

WSSC Water will send you free "Can the Grease" lid covers. Just email your address to <a href="mailto:communications@wsscwater.com">communications@wsscwater.com</a>, and we will do the rest. (Note: there is a limit of two lids per family.) Most food cans will work with the lids. We do not provide the cans.

Just remember: To keep the grease out, "Can it. Cool it. Toss it."



Did you know using salt on walkways, driveways and roads is harmful to our environment? That includes sources of drinking water and the pipes and pumps needed to supply water to our customers.

Once the ice and snow melt, the salt doesn't go away. It seeps into the ground and wells, and travels with stormwater into streams, wells and drinking water reservoirs. It also corrodes pipes.

Please remember to be saltwise! A 12-ounce coffee mug full of salt is enough to treat a 20-foot driveway or 10 sidewalk squares. Please visit wsscwater.com/saltwise to learn more.


